Congratulations you have decided to host a Urological Excellence Conference!

The Urology Excellence Conference is the big event that Canadian Urology nurses look forward to each year. It is an opportunity to meet with colleagues and industry reps and to learn about new things in nursing and urology.

Once the decision is made to hold the Conference, hopefully two to three years prior to the event, a committee will be formed. The first thing to do is to choose the venue. A facility is needed that can accommodate 150 delegates and 30+ booths for the sponsors. Rooms will be needed for concurrent and keynote speakers. You will require:

A Ballroom or room large enough to hold 35-40 exhibitors

A room to hold 150-170 persons for keynote and plenary sessions.

2-3 breakout rooms able to hold at least 50 persons each.

All the meals are provided during the conference. The facility's ability to feed your delegates and exhibitors as well as the cost of breakfast, lunch and coffee breaks for Friday and Saturday is important. The menus are also an important consideration. Usually several hotels/conference centres should be evaluated.

The Hotel or conference centre will require a deposit. A bank account will need to be opened and a Treasurer named. The UNC national will loan the Chapter start up funds of \$2000 if needed.

You will spend approximately \$65,000-75,000 to host the conference. Some cities may be more expensive than other to hold conferences. The Sponsorship co-ordinator is a very important and time-consuming position as this person will be responsible for initial contact with exhibitors as well as ongoing contact with them.

The funds from exhibiting companies' forms a great part of the money

needed to pay for the event. The exhibitors provide about 70% of revenue. The revenue generated will vary with each meeting.

A sample of the contracts and letters to send to exhibitors and speakers are all on a CD that travels to your Chapter for use.

Speakers generally include local physicians, nurses who have submitted abstracts and inspirational speakers. Abstract forms are mailed or are available on the UNC website after the Conference the year before with a deadline, usually early March. The Executive sends a committee out in March, which includes the President, National Sponsorship Coordinator, VP from your area, and someone from the next year's event.

Each concurrent speaker receives airfare, one night hotel accommodation, conference registration and a \$150 honorarium paid for by the UEC. Short paper and poster presenters receive \$100.00 off their registration.

Honorariums for Keynote speakers are negotiated at the initial approach.

Other costs include printing and paper for brochures and syllabus, advertising and Audio Visual support.

Posters advertising your conference usually show local photos and information on where and when the conference will be held. The posters should be available at the UEC prior to yours for members to take home. Reliable office equipment (printer etc) is important.

Brochures, with registration forms, are mailed in late May or early June of the year of your conference and are available at the CUA meeting held the end of June. Registration forms and the brochure will be available on the UNC website after June 1st.

The CUA is a great time to touch base with the Sponsors to remind them of the UEC meeting and promote the meeting as well as ensure their participation. Members of your planning committee who are available should be encouraged to attend the CUA.

The UNC website will advertise the Conference and set up online registration.

The Syllabus is printed when the final format is ready. Speakers information, hotel information and UNC information is included. Hopefully the speakers will

provide their biographies and copies of their presentation/ Power Point slides. Reliable Audio-visual support is needed for the presentations, to ensure the sessions run smoothly.

The Friday fun night requires a dinner and entertainment for a group that is mainly the attendees and sometimes their spouses, as well as some exhibitors. The day is long so the night cannot be too late.

As well as the Committee, volunteers are brought in to help with registration, logistics and to be "gofers".

As the big day approaches, meetings will be frequent and busy as deadlines for registration, syllabus printing, and preparations come closer. Nurses often will register at the last minute, waiting for funding or time off work. The Registration committee will have to be ready to print receipts, certificates of attendance hours and turn registration funds over to the Treasurer.

A conference bag is often sponsored by one of the exhibitors, the conference bag usually contains some goodies for the delegates as well as registration information, receipts, and syllabus.

We hope to have a Conference that everyone will enjoy and gain knowledge for the continuing state of the art care of their patients. ■

UNC Survey Report

In December 2007 a survey was sent to all UNC members. We presently have 122 members and of these 32 sent in a return. Although definitive conclusions cannot be drawn from the small numbers, results were interesting and many good suggestions were put forward.

The first set of questions centered around UNC elections of officers. Many said they would like a more formal process with names and bios of nominations in advance via mail and e-mail. It would give all members an opportunity to participate. Not everyone is able to attend the Urological Excellence Conference. There were some who favored a secret ballot while others preferred to leave the voting to a show of hands. Some even wanted a mail in vote.

As we cannot change the method until the UNC Constitution has been amended further proposals for change and voting will take place at the Annual General Meeting at Toronto in October, 2008.

Membership of the Canadian Nurses Association (CNA) was the next question. A large proportion of our members are from Ontario where nurses are not required to belong to the CNA. Nurses from Quebec are not members as well. The UNC Executive is looking at formally affiliating with CNA but 80% of our membership are required to be CNA members. This question would be better addressed on our membership form.

The research nursing questions showed we have several Urology research nurses who are keen to collaborate, present papers and stats info.

Just about everyone was aware of our UNC website. Suggestions included teaching tools on most common procedures, case studies, info on specialties at large centers, pictures from conferences and links.

Thanks to all those who answered the questions, made comments and suggestions and sought to be a part of their organization. ☐
